Cloudy Water?

What is Nonpoint Source, you ask?

Nonpoint Source (NPS) pollution is caused when rain, snowmelt, or wind carry pollutants and nutrients off the land and into lakes, streams or wetlands. In a lake community soap from car washing, fertilizers from our lawns, and oils and gasoline from our boats, mowers, and cars can enter the lake and cause cloudiness of the water, invasive plants to grow, and muck to accumulate on the lakebed. This makes the lake look dark and dirty.

Want clean, clearer water to swim in and beaches free of muck and weeds? It starts with small steps you and your neighbors can take on your lake property. Start by getting the lake "picked up". Keep your shoreline and public areas free of windblown plastic bags, bottles, and trash. Maintain your watercraft away from the shoreline so gas and oils don't end up in the water. Wash your cars and boats on the lawn away from the lake so soapy water soaks into the ground.

The purpose of my workgroup, NPS, is to help the public improve their lakes and streams water quality. We have a variety of publications to help you find small steps you and your neighbors can take to make a start towards improved water quality. Three terrific ones listed below describe the problem, steps you can take to start cleaning up the lake, and how you can design your landscape and lawn to help keep pollutants out of the lake.

Drain improvements are completed on the north end with a new bridge, bigger outlet culvert, and projections are by summers end, we will have our legal lake level structure installed providing predictable seasonal lake levels for setting your docks and boat lifts. Also, working with the DNR through Yankee Springs, there are several improvements coming to the Long Lake boat launch including signage that limits excessive over parking, clarity for hours of operation, and removal of brush overgrowth on the lakeshore of the ramp area. Other projects on the docket are a Loon nesting platform, an Osprey nesting platform and acquiring a six-acre parcel formerly known as the pike rearing marsh on the north end of Long Lake.

Weed Treatment 2022

It looks like we may finally moving into warmer weather, and with that comes warmer water and the beginning of our invasive weed treatments for this year.

We should be doing the spring survey sometime in the next two weeks or so followed by the first application around the last week of May or first week of June depending on the water temperature of the lake. This one will be primarily for Milfoil and various pondweeds. We will not be doing any treatment that would restrict the use of the lake during Memorial weekend. Approximately two to three weeks after the first treatment we will be treating for Cabomba and Starry Stonewort. Follow up treatment will be done if needed.

We will be pulling samples of a new invasive in the far north end which we have not been able to positively identify and sending them out to be identified and get a recommended treatment for it. That area will be treated as soon as possible after that.

All treatments will have yellow sheets posted in the areas treated listing the products used and any restrictions as to swimming and watering. Generally, what is used in our lake will have a 24 hour ban on swimming and a 3 to 5 day ban on using lake water for irrigation. We will send out an email notice on treatment dates and weather backup dates so please keep us updated on your email addresses. An insert in this mailing lists the expected products that may be used this year.

2021 Watercraft Census

In the summer of 2007, my wife and three granddaughters took a cruise around the lake and counted the watercraft. And in 2017 we five did the same thing. Last summer with a couple of different grands we once again took a cruise and counted what we saw. A very interesting result is listed below:

Type of watercraft	2007	2017	2021
Sail boats	7	1	3
Jet Skis	47	23	54
Paddle Boards	0	24	21
Canoes	19	25	31
Speed Boats	61	57	44
Paddle Boats	61	57	59
Fishing Boats	67	81	69
Kayaks	14	86	138
Pontoon Boats	91	123	136
TOTAL	369	465	550

In the past 15 years the number of non-motorized watercraft has increased by 250% from 101 to 252.

In the past 15 years the number of motorized watercrafts has increased by 14% from 266 to 303.

In the last 15 years the total number of watercrafts has increased by 150% from 369 to 550.

In the past 15 years the number of speedboats has decreased by 28% from 61 to 44.

In the past 15 years the number of pontoon boats has increased by 49% from 91 to 136.

And finally, it appears that many of the newer pontoon boats may be replacing speed boats. They are powered by much higher horsepower motors resulting in faster speeds.
